Navigating Friendships

Underpinning wellbeing is a sense of belonging and connection with those around us. When students feel they have a genuine connection with their peers and their teachers, school becomes a meaningful place, which reinforces students' self-worth and

their place in the world. This sense of belonging and connection with those around us sets the foundation for students to develop self-confidence and friendships. Working in a school like Rossbourne gives us the opportunity to support students with their personal development and the privilege of seeing them learn and mature. Helping our students develop their social skills is an integral aspect of Rossbourne's education program. From time to time it is inevitable that tension and conflict arises and we try to teach our students that conflict is a normal part of a friendship. No friendship (or relationship) is perfect. Once students understand that conflict is normal and can be an opportunity for growth, they are less likely to engage in stereotypical behaviours – which are ultimately all linked to conflict avoidance. This natural urge to avoid conflict is reinforced when children are told by adults to, "Just ignore them". Students have to find some solution to conflict and without support and guidance may choose avoidant or unhealthy ways to deal with the discomfort and anxiety of conflict.

When students find conflict difficult to navigate, they can experience feelings of rejection. No child deserves to be rejected. We can and should encourage children to be kind and tolerant of others, and cruelty is never acceptable. However, some children regularly act in ways that make it hard for other kids to accept them. Helping children with off-putting behaviors to recognize and change these (if possible), can make it less likely that they will be rejected.

On our school website, you can link to SchoolTV and access all the information and resources covering a wide range of topics, including friendships and how to support your child if they find friendships difficult to navigate.

SchoolTV's latest report focuses on belonging. Having a sense of belonging involves more than simply knowing other people. It is also focused on gaining acceptance, attention and support from others, as well as having the opportunity to provide the same to other people. When the pandemic interrupted our lives and changed the way we live, this meant that suddenly many of our young people's main sources of connection with peers and extended family members was removed overnight without warning. As human beings, we have a basic emotional and biological need for connection. It provides us with feelings of identity, security, support, acceptance and community.

Students who have a sense of belonging will experience these feelings which in turn supports their academic, psychological and social development. When young people come together again after a period of instability, there is a period of adjustment. Whilst the rules of the group may be established, acceptance remains paramount and can therefore mean some behaviours become far from rational, making it difficult for their brain to focus on things, such as learning. All these factors combined, leave young people open to being vulnerable. It can sometimes tempt them into making choices or becoming involved in situations they might not ordinarily consider.

The 7/8 community has certainly been putting these skills into practice and sharing their own routines of personal hygiene. They have been able to follow specific steps in the process of many different everyday actions. Taking care of yourself and being presentable is also an important part of our confidence. 'Body in the group' and 'Brain in the group' means... To be facing and looking at the person speaking and following the speaker with our eyes. Staying focused.

'Don't be a space invader' means... To allow people access to the classroom by standing to the side of the door. Staying out of other people's bubbles. Stay an arm's length away.

'Being rigid' or 'Being flexible'.... Rigid means not changing or being stuck on an idea. Flexible means not getting too upset when things change.

'Think it, don't say it' means.... Keeping some thoughts to ourselves. We should ask ourselves, is it true? Is it helpful? Is it kind?

Zones of regulation.... There are four zones. Blue is sad/ tired/sick zone. Green is our learning zone and calm zone. Yellow is our silly, annoying, and over excited zone. Red is our angry or out of control. It is the worst zone to be in.

We know that all these practical and important social skills that we are learning will set us up for success not only here at Rossbourne, but in the workplace, how fortunate are we.

As always, our focus is on developing independence, the skills required to regulate emotions and the attributes students need to become autonomous and independent learners. We seek opportunities for collaboration both in class and between different subject areas. Our courses are designed with the future in mind and trying to ensure students leave our school with the skills required to actively participate in the workforce and society generally.

Our Year 10 students are preparing to move to Senior School and preparations will soon be made for new class compositions and courses. We have been on several excursions this term. The Year 9s were lucky enough to visit Parliament House at the top of Spring Street. We were excited to have the opportunity to sit in the chambers where legislation is passed and saw where Daniel Andrews sits when in parliament. Our local member Mr John Kennedy was alerted to Rossbourne Schools' visit and made the effort to accompany us. Students loved the grandeur of the building and likened gaining entry to going through security at the airport. Some Year 10s commenced Driver's Education at a purposeful built driving facility



in Kilsyth. Despite initial nerves and doubts, all students are driving with flair and now feel confident to work towards their licence. The Year 10s also commenced a semester-long subject City Seekers which involves regular visits to the city. This unit fosters a range of skills: effective clear communication; working collaboratively to problem solve and plan; decision making including conflict resolution & negotiation and developing leadership skills. Each week a different student must lead their group to a landmark location in the CBD and complete all planning and logistics independently of teacher input. This is purposeful learning in fostering independence, students are "allowed to make mistakes." We explicitly support students to learn how to read maps, navigate with travel apps and how to manage when things don't go to plan.

All the teachers involved in the Senior School program have worked very hard to ensure that students have had a wide array of opportunities, and experienced a variety of excellent incursions and excursions.


We started the term with rising Covid-19 cases, and a level of uncertainty of what the term ahead would look like. Staff and students should be commended for their persistence and flexibility as classes were modified on a near daily basis. As the term settled, students were able to enjoy relative normalcy, which was of great benefit for the students mental wellbeing.

Senior Students have worked hard to meet the VCAL outcomes this Term. During English classes, students constructed a narrative piece of writing for the Creative Writing competition. Students also read and analysed competition entries to complete the outcomes of reading and writing for self-expression. In Numeracy classes, students undertook units of work based on money and budgeting to complete the outcome of financial literacy. Students also completed units in Work Related Skills and Personal Development Skills across the Senior School program.

Students selected a group project, choices included HPV, Ross TV, Craft, and Big Sibling. Students will undertake their chosen project across the entirety of Semester 2. Each project intends to develop teamwork, collaboration, critical thinking, creativity, and resilience for Senior School students. We also began the Industry Taster units, where students selected an industry skill that interested them. They learnt about the skills needed in classes and also practically applied their knowledge across the term. Students will rotate to a new industry skill for Term 4. (all students were given the choice of a donut or gelato at the end of the tour), students learnt about sustainability and how this links to seasonality and waste management at the market. They also gained insight into running a small business and how traders cope with their work. This segues nicely into the Global Citizens Unit, students are asked to consider what is being done now to address the global problem of climate change. Students are asked to consider these actions at an individual, local and global level and to think of themselves as "global citizens" who are playing an important part in the global efforts to limit global warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius.

As always, our "superpower" at Rossbourne is the generosity and expertise of teachers who are continually refining their courses to genuinely cater to and differentiate for our learner's needs. Thank you to the teachers who "make it all happen" and to our school leadership for supporting our work.


The Senior students have been actively painting a range of subject matter including some Cubist styled portraits, still life and landscapes. The VCAL students are progressing well with their calendar designs.

MANNINGTREE ROAD PROJECT



In August 2020 Rossbourne finalised the purchase of 2 Manningtree Road, Hawthorn. This was the original homestead of Henry Box who purchased the land in 1854 and built his home "Manningtree" in 1863. The site was most recently used by Vasey RSL, as accommodation for returned service persons widows.

The acquiring of this 2700m2 parcel of land heralds a new and exciting chapter for Rossbourne School. It will allow the school to develop innovative educational facilities and make available much needed green space for the students.

Fact finding workshops were conducted with staff, students and parents before Architects Smith & Tracey commenced the plan to redevelop the existing heritage listed building and integrate a newly built space to give our community a multi-functional, state of the art facility.

The existing manor house is to be retained and renovated. Downstairs will house the relocated library. a resource centre, meeting rooms and administration facilities. Upstairs will become the Wellbeing Hub. This space will be where our Psychologists and Speech Therapist will operate from. It will be an important

space for our students, filled with sensory equipment and a safe place for those who need a space to go and collect their thoughts.

The old apartment buildings to the rear of the block have already been demolished and part of the land will be used to build a 200-seat multipurpose resource centre. This space will be single story, with windows and doors that face west into the current school playground. It will be a multi-functional space for experienced based learning and will be used for exhibitions, performances, workshops and as a flexible teaching space.

Plans have been lodged with Boroondara Council and we are awaiting approval, estimated sometime in October 2022. Once plans are approved, we will seek Tenders from interested builders. Ideally building works will commence in the first half of 2023.

When the Manningtree site works are completed, the facilities in the current buildings will be renovated and repurposed. A further update will be provided towards the end of the year.



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
